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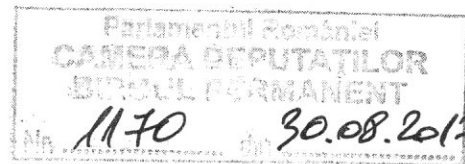

MEMORANDUM INTERN

Tema: Participarea la cea de-a 13-a reuniune a parlamentarilor și experților în probleme parlamentare
(Wroxton, Oxfordshire, Marea Britanie, 29 – 30 iulie 2017)

În perioada 29 – 30 iulie 2017, la Wroxton, Oxfordshire, Marea Britanie, va avea loc cea de-a 13-a reuniune a parlamentarilor și experților în probleme parlamentare, organizat de Uniunea Interparlamentară în colaborare cu Centrul pentru Studii Legislative din cadrul Universității din Hull.

Aceste reuniuni sunt organizate periodic și au ca scop prezentarea și dezbaterăa unor subiecte de actualitate în domeniul parlamentar. Astfel, participanții la reuniune vor avea posibilitatea de a studia rezultatele unor studii care abordează diferite aspecte ale funcționării sistemului legislativ în vederea aplicării lor în activitatea practică.

Printre temele aflate spre dezbateră pe ordinea de zi a workshop-ului menționăm: "Sprijinul legislativ și dezvoltarea", "Parlamentul – comunicarea și implicarea publică", "Rolul parlamentelor în combaterea corupției", "Instruire și cercetare parlamentară", "Independența, obstrucția și suspendarea la nivel parlamentar", "Utilizarea internetului și a petițiilor online", "Rolul Parlamentului în China", "Parlamentul Westminster".

La aceste lucrări a fost desemnat să participe, din partea Comitetului Director al Grupului Român al Uniunii Interparlamentare (GRUI), domnul deputat **Valeriu-Andrei Steriu (PMP)**, chestor al Biroului Permanent, membru al Comisiei juridice, de disciplină și imunități.

Acțiunea are caracter parlamentar conform art. 3, lit. a) din HBPr nr. 1/2003 cu modificările și completările din HBPr nr. 5/2007.

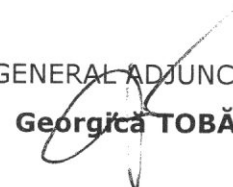
Propunem:

- să se aprobe participarea domnului deputat la acțiunea menționată;
- deplasarea să se efectueze cu avionul, clasa economic, conform traseului anexat pe ruta București – Londra și retur, cu plecare în data de 28 iulie 2017, ora 12:30 (RO 391) și întoarcere în data de 4 august 2017, ora 20:05 (RO 392). Toate cheltuielile aferente transportului pe ruta București-Londra și retur să fie suportate din bugetul Camerei Deputaților. Pentru transferul pe tronsonul Londra-Wroxtton și retur se va acorda o sumă în cuantum de 90 euro pentru închiriere auto pe perioada 28 – 31 iulie, conform art.37, lit. c) din HPBr 1/2003 cu modificările și completările ulterioare din HBPr 5/2007;
- să se acorde drepturi de diurnă categoria a II-a, 100%, majorată conform art.27, alin.2, lit.a, din HBPr nr.1/2003 cu modificările și completările din HBPr nr. 5/2007, pentru 3 ½ zile și cazare plafon B pentru 3 nopți;
- să se suporte din bugetul Camerei Deputaților cheltuielile privind serviciile de asigurare contra accidentelor și asigurare de sănătate pentru perioada efectivă de deplasare;
- să se suporte din bugetul Camerei Deputaților taxa de participare în sumă de 45 de lire sterline/persoană (55 euro);
- să se acorde un avans de 25% cu decontare ulterioară pentru a se suporta din acesta eventualele taxe de oraș percepute de hotel;
- decontarea cheltuielilor să se facă la întoarcerea în țară, pe baza documentelor justificative.

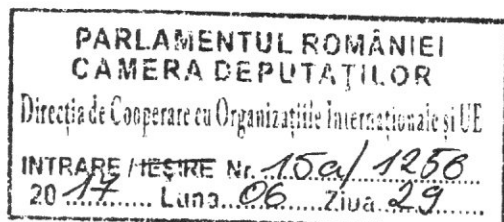

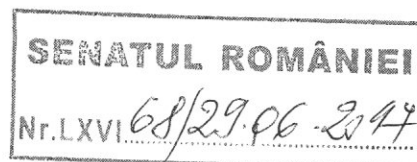
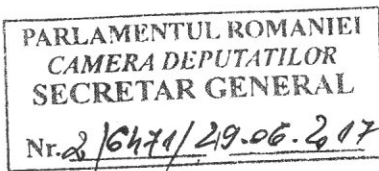

Până la data de 24 iulie 2017, în funcție de agenda de lucru, Grupul PMP își rezervă dreptul de a anula participarea.

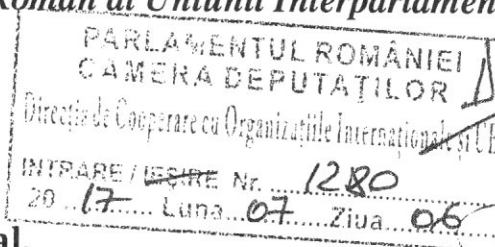
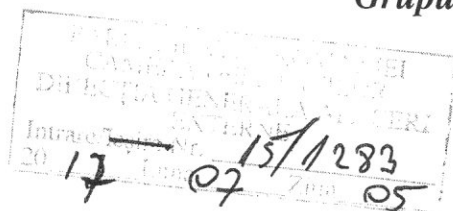

În zilele de 29 și 30 iulie a.c., la Wroxton College, Oxfordshire va avea loc **cea de-a 13-a Reuniune a parlamentarilor și experților în probleme parlamentare**, eveniment co-organizat de Centrul de Studii Legislative al Universității Hull și Uniunea Interparlamentară.

Reuniunile de la Wroxton College au rolul de a facilita interacțiunea dintre parlamentari și experți, în scopul dezbaterii unor subiecte de actualitate din domeniul parlamentar. Participanții au posibilitatea să examineze rezultatele unor studii care abordează aspecte diverse ale funcționării legislativului, în ideea preluării și aplicării lor în activitatea practică.

Agenda reuniunii include teme precum: *Asistență legislativă și dezvoltare; Parlament, comunicare și angajament public; Rolul parlamentelor în combaterea corupției; Formare și documentare parlamentară; Independență, obstrucționare și suspendare în exercitarea mandatului parlamentar; Utilizarea internetului și petițiile on line; Parlamentul de la Westminster.* Reuniunea se va încheia cu o dezbatere privind *Raportul parlamentar mondial* cu tema *Competența parlamentului de a responsabiliza guvernul*, care va fi lansat oficial de UIP cu ocazia celei de-a 137-a Adunări a Uniunii Interparlamentare.

Reuniunile parlamentarilor și experților în probleme parlamentare fac parte din categoria evenimentelor incluse în mod tradițional în calendarul de activități al UIP, bucurându-se de un interes în creștere, datorită subiectelor de actualitate care vizează în mod nemijlocit rolul și funcționarea instituției parlamentare. GRUI a fost reprezentat la majoritatea acestor reuniuni.

I have pleasure in inviting you to participate in the Thirteenth Workshop of Parliamentary Scholars and Parliamentarians being held on Saturday, 29th July and Sunday, 30th July 2017 at Wroxton College, Wroxton, Oxfordshire, in the United Kingdom. The Workshop is co-sponsored by the Inter-Parliamentary Union (IPU) and the Centre for Legislative Studies at the University of Hull.

The purpose of the Workshop is to bring together scholars and parliamentarians in order that research findings likely to be of practical use to parliamentarians can be presented and discussed. The Workshop builds on the success of the previous Workshops, the first held in Berlin in 1994 and the other ten at Wroxton College, now the established venue for the event. Each has proved a stimulating occasion, facilitating interaction between practitioners and researchers. The formal programme is complemented by the opportunity for those attending to mix informally and discuss issues raised in further detail.

As with recent Workshops, the programme is a full one, with two or more panels being held in parallel in each session.

Programme

A provisional list of papers accompanies this invitation. The themes to be covered in the Workshop include

- Legislative support and development
- Parliament, communication and public engagement
- The role of legislatures in tackling corruption
- Parliamentary training and research
- Independence, obstruction and suspension in legislatures
- The use of the Internet and e-petitions
- The role of legislatures in China
- The Westminster Parliament

Following the practice of the recent Workshops, there will be a concluding plenary session addressing problems faced by parliaments in the 21st Century. The session is normally chaired and discussion led by a parliamentarian.

The final programme, giving the timing and composition of panels, will be included in the package of material sent to all participants. The Workshop will commence at 9.15 a.m. on Saturday 29th July and conclude at 3.30 p.m. on Sunday 30th July.

Papers

Papers will be circulated electronically in advance of the Workshop. In the panel sessions, paper givers will briefly summarise their findings, providing time for comments and questions from the floor.

Language

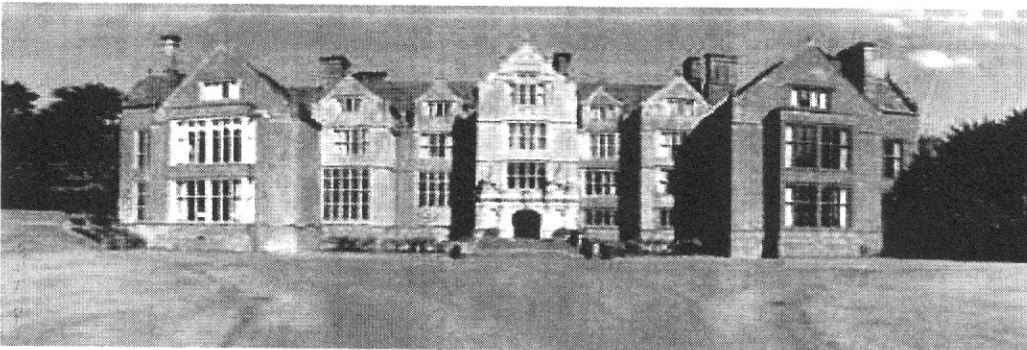
The proceedings will be conducted in English.

Finance

Those attending are responsible for their own funding. The organisers are not able to assist with financial support.

Venue

The venue for the Workshop is Wroxton College, Wroxton, Near Banbury, Oxfordshire, in the United Kingdom. Wroxton College is the overseas campus of Fairleigh Dickinson University.



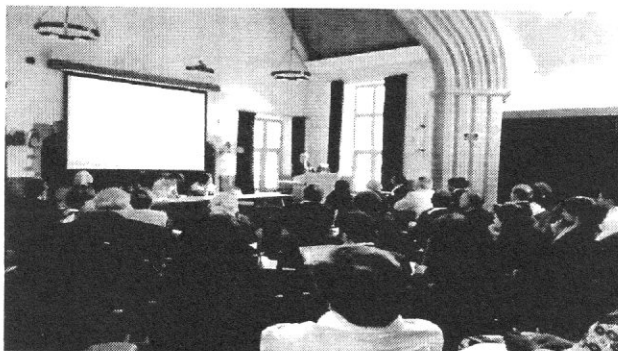
The College is housed in a magnificent 17th Century Jacobean mansion (above), the ancestral home of Lord North (Prime Minister under King George III), and nestling in 50 acres of its own landscaped grounds. When not attending sessions, participants will have an opportunity to explore the mansion and the grounds. The mansion has its own library, chapel, and spacious reading room. There is also a gymnasium in the basement. A guided tour of the house will be available during the weekend of the Workshop. Wi-fi is available throughout the College.

The village of Wroxton is also of interest, with thatched cottages and a parish church housing the remains of various members of the North family, several of them significant figures in the history of England. The village lies three miles outside Banbury. It is within easy reach of Oxford and Shakespeare's birthplace of Stratford upon Avon. It is also within easy reach of London both by road

and rail. The town lies just off the M40 motorway. There is a regular coach service between London Heathrow airport and Banbury. There is also a regular coach service between London Gatwick and Banbury. Birmingham airport is to the north of Banbury and there are regular rail services between Birmingham and Banbury. There are taxis available for the short journey from Banbury to Wroxton.

The registration form enables you to select from a number of options, ranging from the basic registration fee through to a comprehensive package encompassing accommodation and meals. For anyone not residing in College, there is the option of booking meals in College. For anyone paying only the registration fee, this includes refreshments between panels but does not include any meals.

Please note that the number of rooms available in College is limited and early booking is therefore advisable.

For those preferring instead to stay in a hotel, there are hotels in Banbury, close to Wroxton, and one in Wroxton itself, within walking distance of the College.
